ADVANCED CERTAMEN RECAP

This was—as I say every year—the most memorable Nationals Certamen of all time. Some have described it as "the perfect ending," "going out with a bang," and "silencing the doubters." It was that and more.

The run-up: Hundreds of hours of preparation, studying, and practice are put in by Wisconsin's Certamen teams every year—this year was no different. As such, we went into the tournament reasonably optimistic, but searching somewhat for answers.

Nerves were already shot by the time of the draw—that's what having a national officer and a candidate for office will do to you. Nonetheless, we sent the luckiest member of our team, Adam, up for the draw.

Round 1: WI-IL-IN Round 2: WI-TN-TX Round 3: WI-VT-LA

Round 1: Practice and experience matter very little for Round 1. Everyone is nervous, everyone is jumpy, and the only way to fix it is to score some points. Although we admittedly lost the round, it was a close-fought battle – 160-155 to a tough Illinois team. Much more important than the score, however, was the confidence we received from putting up a solid number of points and the resilience we showed by staging a comeback in the final five tossups.

Round 2: Unfortunately, Wisconsin Certamen often finishes strongly but rarely starts well. This round proved to be different. Following 70 points in the first 5 tossups, we cruised to a confident 155-95 victory over Texas—a team we play every year but have never overcome. Perhaps this was the moment when we realized we had something special.

Round 3: After escaping from the last twenty minutes of my dinner, I made it to Round 3, suited and booted. The goal of the round was, quite simply, to score points—and score points we did. 18 tossups, 305 points, and, as we soon found out, the second seed. Our draw for semifinals: Texas and Massachusetts.

Semifinals: Texas and Massachusetts have been our bogey teams for a long time. Although we had finally beaten Texas in Round 2, there remained work left to be done. Again a strong start buoyed us forward—after 55 points in the first three tossups, we rode out 110-55-25 winners and into Wisconsin's first final in more than a decade.

Finals: I think I speak for everyone when I say that this was an unforgettable round. Three of the first four questions were challenged—and that was just the start. Once more we began strongly, grabbing the first two tossups, but Florida soon put us under pressure. After Tossup 7, we were down 55-45. The question remained—how would we respond?

To answer in a word—brilliantly. This was a true team performance. Between 8 and 16, everyone grabbed a tossup and following 19, we were up 25 points—it seemed to be all over. However, that was not the case; Florida successfully challenged an earlier bonus and were suddenly back within reach. Despite this, we soon secured the victory with a challenge of our own and the celebrations began. Unfortunately, Ram and I had to run—literally, as we were forty minutes late for our colloquia sessions.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank one last time all the people who helped us earn Wisconsin's first championship in two decades.




